The Broward County Schools and Communities Scholastic Chess Initiative

Report No. 2
June 2015 to December 2016

Scholastic chess teaches critical thinking skills to improve student academic success; a key component of the new Florida Standards is a focus on in-depth critical-thinking and problem solving skills rather than rote memorization for English language arts and acquiring an ability to understand and apply mathematical concepts.

In the 2014-15 school year, the **National Scholastic Chess Foundation** (NSCF) partnered with the **Broward Education Foundation** to launch the **Next Move Chess Initiative** to bring chess to students of all grades in schools and in community programs. The first goal was to train teachers as well as other youth workers to be able to teach chess. The NSCF created two full-day **Demystifying Chess Workshops** to take someone from having little to no knowledge of chess to being able to deliver approximately 26 weeks of instruction, in class or in aftercare. As of December 2016, 370 teachers, youth workers, police officers, and even some parents and student volunteer mentors, have completed Workshop #1: Teaching the Basics. Of these, 205 have also completed Workshop #2: Moving Beyond the Basics.

Over 150 new or expanded chess programs are now in operation across Broward County led by teachers who have taken the Demystifying Chess workshops. Here are just a few of these programs:

At **New River Middle School**, science teacher Mateo Garcia continues to offer his 6th grade chess elective with 28 to 30 new students participating each quarter. In addition, he has a chess club with 20 committed players who meet every Tuesday after school. And, every Monday morning he offers open chess to around 50 students. Because the students arrive at different times, Mr. Garcia presents a short lesson at the end of the period so they all leave with advice on how to improve their play. His goal for the rest of this year is to find some schools to play against.

At **Lauderdale Lakes Middle School**, Mr. McKenzie teaches chess every Friday to over 180 students. He also has 25-30 students who participate in after school chess 3 or 4 days each week. Mr. McKenzie previously taught at Castle Hill Elementary where he was able to take a small team to the All-Girls Nationals in Chicago; his team took second place in their first ever national competition! In an effort to keep girls interested in chess in middle school, he will often arrange separate instruction times. Mr. McKenzie makes time to work with NSCF community programs.

"I teach High School Alternative to External Suspension (AES) Program. The program is designed to serve students suspended from their home school from one to ten days. I attended the Demystifying Chess Workshops 1 and 2. Immediately following the workshops, I started teaching beginning chess lessons to AES students daily from 2:00 to 3:00. I also had a student participate in the City of Sunrise Mayors Chess Challenge. He was seen on the local news and pictured in our weekly newsletter.

"I now offer chess lessons every Friday to Cypress Run students allowed to participate in Friday Rewards. Many studies show playing chess results in increased reading and math scores. I believe children who play chess are thinking their way to success. I have witnessed students who cannot sit still for fifteen minutes become immersed in logical thinking. The great thing about chess as a teaching tool is it can help all children stimulate their mind, become better critical thinkers, problem solvers, and decision makers."

While the chess club at Atlantic Technical HS only meets for a half-hour at lunch time once a week, the players all travel to Margate Elementary once each month.

“My high school students have been going to Margate Elementary once a month during this past school year to play and help teach the children there. To wrap up the year, we hosted a chess tournament between the elementary and high school students at Atlantic Technical HS. They played 5 rounds of 10 minute games, and if there was no outright winner, we used the point system to determine the winner. As you can see on the picture of the rosters, several of the elementary students won some games over the high schoolers! At the end, we awarded one winner from each school a magnetic chess set. My very supportive principals, Robert Crawford and Vicky Laporte, provided pizza, drinks & cookies for all the competitors. We all look forward to continuing and improving our chess skills next year. 
